In other words, how can you address systemic oppression against multiply marginalized disabled people?

To ensure all people are welcome in Illinois, including multiply marginalized people with disabilities, we need to partner with private and public employees to make sure equal and fair employment opportunities exist, funds are allocated to establishing safe and accessible facilities in the communities with significant marginalized populations, and access to mental health and counseling services is available.

Q11 How will you ensure a free and appropriate public education for Illinois students with disabilities?

Increasing funding to public schools to provide accessible facilities, including elevators, wheelchair ramps, railings, playground equipment and ensuring funding is available for teachers and classroom staff.

Q12 How will you work to expand affordable, accessible, integrated housing options in Illinois?

Providing funding to group homes and community-based living facilities and shifting away from only institutional care facilities and ensuring more affordable housing for all.

Q13 What would you do to make Illinois more compliant with the Ligas, Williams, and Colbert Consent Decrees?

Many people with disabilities would prefer to remain in their homes and be as independent as possible, but the state invests in institutional care. To comply with the decrees, we must fully fund home/community-based community services.
